DRAFT TOWN OF PITTSFORD TOWN BOARD APRIL 21, 2020

Proceedings of a regular meeting of the Pittsford Town Board held on Tuesday, April 21, 2020 at 6:00 P.M. local time. The meeting took place with Board members participating remotely using Zoom.

PRESENT: Supervisor William A. Smith, Jr.; Councilmembers Kevin Beckford, Cathy Koshykar,

Katherine B. Munzinger and Stephanie M. Townsend.

ABSENT: None.

ALSO PRESENT: Staff Members: Paul J. Schenkel, Commissioner of Public Works; Cheryl Fleming,

Personnel Director; Greg Duane, Finance Director; Robert Koegel, Town Attorney; and

Linda M. Dillon, Town Clerk.

ATTENDANCE: Also in attendance was Randy Shepard, from The Bonadio Group, to present their

completed Audit Report to the Town Board. Also in attendance was a sign language interpreter. There were approximately 13 - 16 members of staff and public who viewed

the meeting via Zoom.

Supervisor Smith called the Town Board meeting to order at 6:00 P.M. and led members in the Pledge of Allegiance. The Town Clerk noted all Town Board members present.

HOLOCAUST REMEMBRANCE DAY (Yom HaShoah)

Supervisor Smith recognized Councilmember Townsend, who noted today as Holocaust Remember Day (Yom HaShoah). She referred specifically to Erika Newmann, Mario Finzi, Thomas Pfeffer and Monique Jackson, among the 6 million killed in the Holocaust. She remembered also Holocaust survivors, such as Peter Silverstein, Celia Simon, Samuel Rind and Lily Haber, among the more than 300 other survivors of the Holocaust who settled in the Rochester area and have made it their home and the home for their children and grandchildren, and who are part of our community today. Councilmember Townsend encouraged everyone to stand against hatred and bigotry no matter where it happens. The Board members thanked Councilmember Townsend.

PRESENTATION OF ANNUAL AUDIT BY THE BONADIO GROUP

Randy Shepard, from The Bonadio Group, reviewed with the Board their annual Audit report and answered questions from the Board relative to the report findings, as well as possible impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic.

OTHER BUSINESS

PUBLIC HEARING SET FOR LOCAL LAW NO. 3 OF 2020 – RRAA ZONING DISTRICT AND PERTINENT SUBDIVISION REGULATIONS

Members discussed the need to move forward with the review and draft of the new RRAA Zoning District. Councilmember Townsend asked about accommodating a traditional public hearing during this time when the Board must meet remotely. Supervisor Smith noted that a recent Executive Order from the Governor now permits public hearings by remote meeting. He noted that for formal public hearings such as this the Town would arrange for anyone to be able to express their views during the hearing, which the law requires. For a public hearing, any person, whether a resident of the Town or not, can express their views.

Councilmember Beckford asked the Supervisor to make the same kind of arrangements for public comments at Town Board meetings, during this period when the Board must meet remotely, as must be made for formal public hearings. Councilmember Koshykar supported this request. The Town Attorney pointed out the difference between a formal public hearing and regular proceedings during a Town Board meeting: a public hearing requires comments in real time. He said that, other than at a public hearing, the law does not require any public comments at all during a Town Board meeting; yet notwithstanding this the Town of Pittsford has invited and solicited public comments at Town Board meetings for many years and continues to do so today, as it has for this meeting being held now.

Supervisor Smith reviewed the provisions for public comment that have been set in place for this temporary period in which physical meetings in Town Hall have been replaced by remotely-held meetings. When the agenda and associated materials are released, the Town has publicized means for the public to view the meeting and has publicized the means for residents to submit comments, by e-mail to a dedicated mailbox, by 2:30 pm on the date of each meeting. He noted that municipalities around the state use this method during normal times as well as during the current coronavirus lockdown.

The Supervisor continued that this method was adopted in order to verify that commenters are Pittsford residents. This has been the practice for Pittsford Town Board meetings. He said this is easily done in a physical meeting

where those wishing to comment sign in. It is more difficult to do remotely, especially in the current circumstances where almost no staff are present at Town Hall. Submission by 2:30pm allows time to verify.

The Supervisor noted that a public hearing is open to anyone who lives anywhere, so there is no need verify resident status and consequently residency status does not pose a problem for real time comments.

He noted that for situations other than formal public hearings it is important to the integrity of our Board meetings that comments be fully open to all Pittsford residents and only to Pittsford residents. He said this is why we need a way to verify resident status for comments during this temporary period of meeting remotely.

The Supervisor continued that public comments from residents have been part of Pittsford Town Board meetings for decades; that during his tenure at Town Hall he had expanded opportunities to comment by adding, in addition to the traditional public comment section of each meeting, a specific solicitation for public comments before each item on the Agenda, so the Board could take into consideration such comments before voting on any matter.

Councilman Beckford solicited views of other members of the Board on this subject. The Supervisor noted that this discussion was diverting the Board from its business at the moment and suggested resuming this conversation later in the meeting, after addressing the matter at hand, which is setting a public hearing for the Zoning Code revision.

Councilmember Townsend requested clarification of the process for this proposed Code, noting that she had thought there would be a review of the draft by the Board before the meeting where a hearing is set and would like to have this done in future. This way if changes need to be made, they can be incorporated into the draft law accompanying the notice of hearing. Supervisor Smith agreed with this proposition and noted his belief that it had been fulfilled, since two Town Board members, Kate Munzinger and Kevin Beckford, were on the committee that drafted the legislation, and the Town Attorney on April 9th sent the draft legislation to Councilmembers Townsend and Koshykar for review and comment, and solicited their comments for a second time a week later on April 16th. He said if Board members wish to have a copy of proposed legislation for discussion at a Board meeting prior to a meeting where the Board will consider setting a hearing date, the process described by Councilmember Townsend accomplishes the purpose and we can proceed accordingly. Attorney Koegel noted that, if necessary or desirable, edits can still be made to the legislation that do not materially change its substance, after the hearing is set and before the Board votes on the actual legislation. Councilmember Townsend noted the time sensitivity of this particular legislation and endorsed the idea of proceeding to set the hearing now.

Thereafter, Councilmember Munzinger offered a motion to set the Public Hearing on Local Law No. 3 of 2020, seconded by Councilmember Townsend, and voted on by members as follows: Ayes: Beckford, Koshykar, Munzinger, Townsend and Smith. Nays: none.

The following Resolution was declared carried as follows:

WHEREAS, true and correct copies of proposed Local Law No. 3 of 2020 were delivered to each member of the Town Board; and

WHEREAS, due consideration has been given to the adoption of said proposed Local Law No. 3 of 2020, by all members of the Town Board who were present; and

WHEREAS, it was the considered opinion of all members of the Town Board who were present that a public hearing should be held on the 26th day of May 2020, at 6:00 p.m. at the Town Hall, 11 South Main Street, Pittsford, New York, to consider the adoption of said proposed Local Law No. 3 of 2020;

NOW, on motion duly made and seconded, it was

RESOLVED, that a public hearing be held on the 26th day of May, 2020, at 6:00 P.M., Local Time, at the Town Hall, 11 South Main Street, Pittsford, New York, or by electronic conference or meeting as permitted by law, on the question of the adoption of said proposed Local Law No. 3 of 2020; and be it further

RESOLVED, that a Notice of Hearing and a copy of said proposed Local Law 3 of 2020, or a summary thereof, be published in a newspaper previously designated as an official newspaper for publication of public notices, not less than five (5) days prior to said hearing; and be it further

RESOLVED, that the Town Clerk shall post certified copies of both this resolution and said proposed Local Law No. 3 of 2020, or a summary thereof, on the Town website www.townofpittsford.org, and on the bulletin board maintained by the Town Clerk pursuant to § 40(6) of the Town Law, for a period of not less than five (5) days prior to said public hearing.

UPDATE ON COVID-19 AND EFFECTS ON REVENUE

Supervisor Smith gave board members an update on the impacts of the Covid-19 pandemic on the Town and our budget. He noted that in discussion with Supervisors of the other towns in Monroe County, it is estimated that towns will suffer an approximate decline of 20% in revenue from sales tax as compared to last year. If Pittsford had used different methods of budgeting, this would mean a decrease in expected income of approximately \$800,000. However, as part of its conservative budgeting practices, Pittsford uses 3-year averaging for sales tax projections, meaning in this case that the decrease in sales tax revenue we currently anticipate, compared to budget, would be approximately \$195,000 rather than nearly \$800,000.

As far as loss of income due to refunds being made with respect to recreation programs, the Town has currently refunded \$24,000 in fees and anticipates an additional \$38,300. Therefore, total lost revenue from Recreation programs through the end of May is projected to be \$116,000. Following inquiry from Councilmember Townsend, Finance Director Greg Duane indicated that this is the figure for Recreation refunds only; refunds for Kings Bend Park lodge reservations are estimated at \$20,000, if they all are canceled.

RESOLUTION SUPPORTING MUNICIPAL RELIEF IN THE FEDERAL CARES ACT (Coronavirus Aid, Relief and Economic Security Act)

Councilmember Koshykar introduced a Resolution, recommended by the State Association of Towns, in support of the federal CARES Act. The Resolution will be sent to our Congressman and Senators encouraging them to support efforts and legislation to include all municipalities, regardless of size or population in the CARES Act.

Thereafter, Councilmember Koshykar made a motion to approve the Resolution, seconded by Councilmember Beckford, and voted on by members as follows: Ayes: Beckford, Koshykar, Munzinger, Townsend and Smith. Nays: none.

The Resolution was declared carried as follows:

WHEREAS, the federal government recently enacted the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act to address the economic fallout from the coronavirus pandemic in the United States; and

WHEREAS, Section 601 of the CARES Act (P.L. 116-136) provides a \$150 billion fund for states, tribal governments, and units of local government with a population in excess of 500,000 people; and

WHEREAS, less than one-half of 1 percent of municipalities in the entire United States meet this population threshold and are thus ineligible to receive direct funding from the federal government; and

WHEREAS, of the 933 towns in New York, 931 are not eligible for direct federal funding under the CARES Act, including the Town of Pittsford; and

WHEREAS, towns provide essential services to the 9 million New Yorkers town residents, including, but not limited to, ambulance, police and fire protection services, building and code enforcement, and highway maintenance, and have continued to do so throughout the ongoing health crisis; and

WHEREAS, the coronavirus pandemic has created significant financial stress for local governments in New York as an estimated \$2 billion in sales tax revenue has been lost, as well as other sources of revenue such as permit fees, justice court fines, and mortgage recording tax; and

WHEREAS, the depletion of different revenue sources for local governments, combined with lack of funding, will result in reducing essential services or shifting the cost onto real property taxpayers, many of whom are experiencing their own financial stress;

NOW THEREFORE BE IT

RESOLVED, that the Town of Pittsford, NY calls upon United States Congressional Representative Joseph Morelle, Senator Charles Schumer, and Senator Kirsten Gillibrand, to support federal funding related to the coronavirus pandemic that is directly delivered to all municipalities, regardless of population size.

COMMUNITY CHOICE AGGREGATION (CCA) UPDATE

Supervisor Smith updated the Town Board. He stated that we do not need, as he thought previously, to have two additional public meetings before proceeding to solicit bids for electricity under the Town's CCA program. There will be a further extensive program of public engagement, once a bid satisfying the three Towns' specifications is received. The next step will be for the attorneys for Pittsford, Brighton and Irondequoit to review and reach agreement with Joule Assets on an Energy Supply Agreement. The attorneys are working on this now.

PROCEDURES FOR REMOTE MEETINGS

Continuing a discussion from earlier, Councilmember Beckford expressed respectful disagreement with requiring public comments for remote meetings during this temporary period to be submitted by mid-afternoon on meeting dates. He said he believes that verifying Pittsford residency of commenters can be done by other means and he wants to hear from commenters during the meeting. The Supervisor noted that the current arrangements are intended to replicate the conditions at a pre-lockdown physical meeting of the Town Board as closely as practical, including verification of residency for comments. Councilman Beckford noted that he wants to have give-and-take with members of the public during Town Board meetings. He solicited the views of other Board members.

Councilmember Munzinger indicated that she was comfortable with the current procedure for accepting comments from the public; that verifying residency protects the integrity of the meetings. Councilmember Koshykar reiterated her support for Councilman Beckford's request. She noted that mid-afternoon submission of comments cannot accommodate public comment on matters brought up under "Other Matters" in the agenda, and that we have had several important items come up under Other Matters tonight. Councilmember Townsend indicated her personal preference would be to receive comments in real time, as it occurs during our physical Board meetings. She noted, however, that the Supervisor is the chair of the board meetings, was elected by residents to make such decisions and she respects his authority to do so. Supervisor Smith noted that the need for confirming Pittsford residency for commenters was underscored by the packing of a Town Board meeting last fall with non-residents on the occasion of adopting the updated Comprehensive Plan for Pittsford, in an effort to influence its adoption. He noted that no Pittsford resident has been denied the opportunity to submit comments for this meeting or the previous meeting, which was the first meeting held through Zoom.

EVENTS AND OTHER UPDATES

Supervisor Smith advised members that the American Legion has not yet notified the Town of a decision, but it appears highly unlikely that the Memorial Day Ceremony and Parade will be held this year.

Councilmember Townsend updated members on the 19th Amendment Commemoration planned for August, noting that the expected planning meeting was postponed by the COVID lockdown. It will be rescheduled. She indicated that she will be drafting an outline of options for this event relative to social distancing, in the event that will be necessary for the event, and will update the board as plans develop.

PUBLIC COMMENT

No public comments were offered regarding any general matters.

As there was no further business, the Supervisor adjourned the meeting at 7:20 P.M.



Technology Law. The SHIELD Act introduces significant changes, including:

- Broadening the definition of "Private Information." The Act broadens the definition of
 "private information" to include biometric information and username/email address in
 combination with a password or security questions and answers. It also includes an
 account number or credit/debit card number, even without a security code, access code,
 or password if the account could be accessed without such information.
- Expanding the definition of "Breach." The Act expands the definition of "breach of the security of the system" to include unauthorized "access" of computerized data that compromises the security, confidentiality, or integrity of private information, and it provides sample indicators of access.
- Clarifying "Substitute Notice by E-mail." The Act creates a new exception where notice
 by e-mail is no longer permissible when the breached information includes the data
 subject's e-mail address in combination with a password or security question and
 answer.

Sentences have been added to and modified within Section 8-3, 8-4 and 8-8 of the Town Code in order to update the "Computer System Security Breach Notification Policy" to comply with the changes introduced in the New York SHIELD Act.

A public hearing on this proposed Local Law #4 of 2020 (previously numbered Local Law #3 of 2020) was set by Town Board resolution on March 17, 2020, but the hearing was not held due to the pandemic. A public hearing must be rescheduled to enact Local Law #4 of 2020, a copy of which is submitted herewith. A copy of sections 8-3, 8-4 and 8-8 of the existing Code showing the proposed changes is also submitted for ease of reference.

LOCAL LAW NO. 4 OF 2020:
THE ADOPTION OF PROPOSED LOCAL LAW
NO. 4 of 2020: AMENDING CHAPTER 8
OF THE TOWN OF PITTSFORD MUNICIPAL CODE
ENTITLED "COMPUTER SYSTEM SECURITY
BREACH NOTIFICATION POLICY"

Sec. 1 Title

This Local Law shall be known as "Local Law No.4 of 2020: Amending Chapter 8 of The Town of Pittsford Municipal Code Entitled "Computer System Security Breach Notification Policy."

Sec. 2 Amendment to Existing Law

The Pittsford Town Code, Chapter 8, shall be amended to revise §§ 8-3, 8-4, and 8-8 to read, as follows:

§ 8-3. Authority.

This chapter is enacted pursuant to the New York State Constitution, New York Municipal Home Rule Law § 10, General Business Law §§ 899-aa and 899-bb, and New York State Technology Law § 208, and may be amended from time to time by Town Board resolution or local law.

§ 8-4. Definitions.

As used in this chapter, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

BREACH OF SECURITY OF THE SYSTEM — unauthorized access to or acquisition of, or access to or acquisition without valid authorization, of computerized data that compromises the security, confidentiality, or integrity of private information maintained by the Town. Good faith access to, or acquisition of, private information by an employee or agent of the Town for the purposes of the employee or agent is not a breach of the security of the system, provided that the private information is not used or subject to unauthorized disclosure. In determining whether information has been accessed, or is reasonably believed to have been accessed, by an unauthorized person or a person without valid authorization, the Town may consider, among other factors, indications that the information was viewed, communicated with, used, or altered by a person without valid authorization or by an unauthorized person.

In determining whether information has been acquired, or is reasonably believed to have been acquired, by an unauthorized person or a person without valid authorization, the Town may consider the following factors, among others:

- A. Indications that the information is in the physical possession and control of an unauthorized person, such as a lost or stolen computer or other device containing information; or
- B. Indications that the information has been downloaded or copied; or
- C. Indications that the information was used by an unauthorized person, such as fraudulent accounts opened or instances of identity theft reported.

CONSUMER REPORTING AGENCY — Any person or entity which, for monetary fees, dues or on a cooperative nonprofit basis, regularly engages in whole or in part in the practice of assembling or evaluating consumer credit information or other information on consumers for the purpose of furnishing consumer reports to third parties, and which uses any means or facility of interstate commerce for the purpose of preparing or furnishing consumer reports. A list of consumer reporting agencies may be obtained upon request to the State Attorney General.

DEPARTMENT — Any board, division, committee, commission, council, department, public authority, public benefit corporation, office or other governmental entity performing a governmental or proprietary function for the Town.

PERSONAL INFORMATION — Any information concerning a natural person which, because of name, number, personal mark, or other identifier, can be used to identify that person.

PRIVATE INFORMATION —

A. Private Information means either:

- (i.) Personal information consisting of any information in combination with any one or more of the following data elements, when either the data element or the combination of personal information plus the data element is not encrypted or encrypted with an encryption key that has also been accessed or acquired:
 - 1. social security number;
 - 2. driver's license number or non-driver identification card number;
 - 3. account number, credit or debit card number, in combination with any required security code, access code, password or other information which would permit access to an individual's financial account;
 - 4. account number, or credit or debit card number, if circumstances exist wherein such number could be used to access to an individual's financial account without additional identifying information, security code, access code, or password;
 - biometric information, meaning data generated by electronic measurements of an individual's unique physical characteristics, such as fingerprint, voice print, or retina or iris image, or other unique physical representation or digital representation which are used to authenticate or ascertain the individual's identity; or
- (ii.) a user name or e-mail address in combination with a password or security question and answer that would permit access to an online account.
- B. "Private information" does not include publicly available information that is lawfully made available to the general public from Town records.

TOWN — The Town of Pittsford, County of Monroe.

§ 8-8. Method of notification.

The required notice must be directly provided to the affected individuals by one of the following methods:

- A. Written notice;
- B. Electronic notice, provided that the person to whom notice is required to be provided has expressly consented to receiving notice in electronic form and a log of each electronic notification is kept by the Town; and provided further that no person or business may require a person to consent to accepting notice in electronic form as a condition of establishing any business relationship or engaging in any transaction;

- C. Telephone notification, provided that a log of each telephone notification is kept by the Town; or
- D. Substitute notice, if the Town demonstrates to the State Attorney General that the cost of providing notice would exceed \$250,000 or that the number of individuals to be notified exceeds 500,000, or the Town does not have sufficient contact information. Substitute notice must include all of the following:
 - (1) E-mail notice when the Town has an e-mail address for the subject persons, except if the breached information includes an e-mail address in combination with a password or security question and answer that would permit access to the online account, in which case the Town shall instead provide clear and conspicuous notice delivered to the consumer online when the consumer is connected to the online account from an internet protocol address or from an online location which the Town knows the consumer customarily uses to access the online account;
 - (2) Conspicuous posting of the notice on the Town's website page, if the Town maintains one; and
 - (3) Notification to major state-wide media.

Sec. 3 Severability

If any clause, sentence, phrase, paragraph or any part of this Local Law shall for any reason be adjudicated finally by a court of competent jurisdiction to be invalid, such judgment shall not affect, impair or invalidate the remainder of this Local law, but shall be confined in its operation and effect to the clause, sentence, phrase, paragraph or part thereof, directly involved in the controversy or action in which such judgment shall have been rendered. It is hereby declared to be the legislative intent that the remainder of this Local Law would have been adopted had any such provision been excluded.

Sec. 4 Effective Date

This Local Law shall take effect immediately upon filing with the Secretary of State.

Below is the "marked up" version of section 8-3, 8-4 and 8-8 of the Computer System Security Breach Notification Policy:

§ 8-3. Authority.

This chapter is enacted pursuant to the New York State Constitution, New York Municipal Home Rule Law § 10, General Business Law §§ 899-aa and 899-bb, and New York State Technology Law § 208, and may be amended from time to time by Town Board resolution or local law.

§ 8-4. Definitions.


As used in this chapter, the following terms shall have the meanings indicated:

BREACH OF SECURITY OF THE SYSTEM — unauthorized access to or acquisition of, or access to or acquisition without valid authorization, of computerized data that compromises the security, confidentiality, or integrity of personal private information maintained by the Town. Good faith access to, or acquisition of, personal private information by an employee or agent of the Town for the purposes of the employee or agent is not a breach of the security of the system, provided that the private information is not used or subject to unauthorized disclosure.

In determining whether information has been accessed, or is reasonably believed to have been accessed, by an unauthorized person or a person without valid authorization, the Town may consider, among other factors, indications that the information was viewed, communicated with, used, or altered by a person without valid authorization or by an unauthorized person.

In determining whether information has been acquired, or is reasonably believed to have been acquired, by an unauthorized person or a person without valid authorization, the Town may consider the following factors, among others:

- A. Indications that the information is in the physical possession and control of an unauthorized person, such as a lost or stolen computer or other device containing information; or
- B. Indications that the information has been downloaded or copied; or
- C. Indications that the information was used by an unauthorized person, such as fraudulent accounts opened or instances of identity theft reported.

 - (2) Conspicuous posting of the notice on the Town's website page, if the Town maintains one; and
 - (3) Notification to major state-wide media.





Ladies and Gentlemen:

In the mid 1970's, Monroe County Pure Waters extended large sewers to many municipalities, with the intent to consolidate wastewater treatment plants and to preserve the environment. At that time, the Pittsford Sewer District closed its plant located on East Street. Since then, the Town of Pittsford's Park Department has been building up its facilities to what you see there today.

The largest structures that still remains from when it was a treatment plant, are the digester tanks, associated piping, and a shed that is still maintained by Pure Waters. The two large concrete tanks sit underneath an earthen embankment. These structures are sitting in the middle of our Parks Department facility and have always hindered our operations.

I have been consulting with the Monroe County Department of Environmental Services, home to Pure Waters and Industrial Waste, on the effective removal of the tanks. A small amount of effluent still exists in the tanks, so their assistance has been invaluable. Due to the construction of the tanks and required treatment and disposal of the remaining effluent, this project is beyond the scope of our abilities and equipment. I suggest that Town Board set a bid opening date for the Digester Tank Removal Project for 11:00 AM on May 21, 2020 in the Department of Public Works.


Ladies and Gentlemen,

The Town of Pittsford has a long standing agreement with the Pittsford Central School District for the fueling needs of the Town fleet. We utilize their fuel facility located at the bus garage. The School District had plans to replace the unleaded tanks and pumps over the summer months. With the closure of school, due to the Covid-19 Pandemic, those plans got moved up.

The Town of Brighton has offered to allow us to use their unleaded pumps located at their Highway Department for the next couple of weeks. Attached you will find an intermunicipal agreement that must be executed by the Town Supervisor.

In the event the Town Board determines that the proposed actions should be taken, the following Resolutions are suggested:

Resolved, that the Town Board authorizes the Town Supervisor to execute an Intermunicipal Agreement with the Town of Brighton for the temporary use of their fueling facilities.



INTER-MUNICIPAL AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE TOWN OF BRIGHTON AND THE TOWN OF PITTSFORD

USE OF TOWN OF BRIGHTON FUEL DESPENSING STATION April 28, 2020

This Memorandum of Agreement, MOA, made as of May 4, 2020, between the Town of Brighton, with offices at 2300 Elmwood Avenue, Rochester, NY 14618, (hereinafter known as the "Town"), and the Town of Pittsford with offices at 11 S. Main St. Pittsford NY 14534

WHEREAS, the Town of Pittsford has requested to utilize the Town of Brighton fuel dispensary to supply gasoline to Town of Pittsford vehicles because its current dispensary is under construction and out of service; and

WHEREAS, the Town of Brighton has sufficient gasoline supply and agrees to permit the Town of Pittsford to use its fuel dispensary to provide gasoline for approximately 20 vehicles for a period of two to three weeks starting on Monday May 4, 2020; and

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the covenants and agreements hereinafter mentions, the parties agree as follows:

- 1. The Town of Brighton authorizes the Town of Pittsford to utilize gasoline fuel from the Town's dispensing station in accordance with procedure established by the Town.
- 2. The value of the fuel to be provided to the Town of Pittsford under this Memorandum of Understanding will be the actual cost to the Town of Brighton per gallon of fuel, as determined by the Town, plus 7% of the total cost of fuel as an administrative reimbursement.
- 3. A detailed record of actual fuel use, and its associated value, will be kept by the Town of Brighton and provided to the Town of Pittsford. No later than July 30, 2020 an annual accounting of actual value of fuel will be prepared by the Town of Brighton and submitted to the Town of Pittsford for payment. The Town of Pittsford will reimburse the Town no later than 30 days after the accounting is provided to the Town of Pittsford.
- 4. The Town of Brighton reserves the right to cease providing fuel to the Town of Pittsford if the Town finds that it cannot meet its current gas fuel obligations.
- 5. Each party represents to the other that it has in force, policies of liability insurance protecting against exposures arising out of or in connection with this Agreement and the actions which it may take under this Agreement. Each party agrees to Indemnify as to its negligence the other against liability for the negligent use of vehicles, apparatuses, or supplies including gasoline fuel under this Agreement.

- 6. The Town of Pittsford agrees to protect, defend, indemnify and hold the Town and its employees free and harmless from and against any and all losses, claims, liens, demands and causes of action of every kind and character, including the amount of judgments, penalties, interest, court costs and legal fees incurred by the Town in defense of same, arising in favor of any party, including governmental agencies or bodies, on account of claims, liens, debts, personal injuries, including personal injuries sustained by employees of the Town, death or damage to property, including property of the Town, and without limitation by numeration, all other claims or demands of every character occurring or in any way incident to the use of the Town's fuel dispensary, hereafter all jointly being referred to as "claims".
 - a. Notwithstanding the foregoing, the Town of Pittsford shall not be liable, nor shall the Town of Pittsford have to indemnify the Town or hold the Town harmless for claims resulting from the sole negligence of the Town.
 - b. The Town shall give the Town of Pittsford prompt notice of every claim received by the Town for which claim the Town of Pittsford is, in whole or in part, liable.
 - c. The Town of Pittsford, at its sole expense, agrees to investigate, handle, respond to, or provide defense for and defend any claim made against the Town for which claim the Town of Pittsford is claimed to be in whole or in part, liable, and the Town of Pittsford agrees to bear all other costs and expenses related thereto even if such claim is groundless, false, or fraudulent.
 - d. The Town of Pittsford shall maintain insurance to protect the Town and the Town of Pittsford from and against any and all claims, injury or damage to persons or property, both real and personal, arising from the services herein contracted for such types and in such amounts as is customarily maintained by municipalities serving comparable communities, all as reasonably approved by the Town.
- 7. This Agreement shall be effective from May 4, 2020 to and including June 30, 2020.
