1. Mr. Paulsen reviewed the agenda.

2. Goals from 2002-2006 were reviewed.

- 3. It was suggested that the Collaboration Agreement be reevaluated and renewed. Because there are new members, a date should be set for resigning the agreement. It was further suggested that once the Agreement has been signed, it could be placed on the individual websites.
- 4. Guiding Question #1 was presented: What are our criteria for "quality community" in relation to Pittsford? Mr. Paulsen suggested that the characteristics should be assessable, be replicable, promote collaboration, bring the community closer together and result in people wanting to stay in or move to Pittsford. The group concluded that Pittsford must benchmark against other quality communities to determine the areas in which we do well and the areas that may need improvement.
- 5. Groups brainstormed Guiding Question #2: **How can we assess our progress** in terms of the criteria? The group identified several "buckets" and the criteria for each bucket as follows:

6. Summary/Next steps
