When Town government does the job it should, you don't have to think about it. This derives, I think, from why we have municipal government in the first place. Certain necessities or conveniences need to be or should be in place. Think of sewers, roads, leaf collection, parks and trails, just for starters. All impractical or inconvenient or too costly for any one of us to do on our own. So we organize a municipal government to take on these tasks on behalf of all of us collectively and for the benefit of all.

My goal at Pittsford Town Hall and that of our staff is to get things right, so you can get on with your life. So you don't have to worry about municipal services. You know they're in place and working. You don't need to think much about it unless there's a problem requiring our attention.

Along these lines I've often considered one aspect of my role in Town government and the Town Board's as equivalent in a way to someone you hire to mow your lawn. You have a lawn. Maybe you don't have time or equipment to cut it yourself, so you hire a guy to do it. You don't care about specifics of the equipment, or precisely how high the blade is set or other details, although he's happy to tell you. You care about the cost. Beyond that you just care about the result: the grass gets cut so you can get on with your life without having to think about the lawn.

Now imagine you come home one day and the lawn's been paved over. Concrete where once there was grass. "You hired me to look after the lawn," says the lawnmower guy, "so I did." Not very wise of him, since he's put himself out of business and doomed himself in your eyes. Yet there it is. Not having to worry about an inconvenient chore has been transformed into a massive problem. You might've kept a closer watch on the lawnmower guy after all.

From the Supervisor

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In addition to providing services, Town government has broad authority in many respects. How we exercise it can materially affect your home, your neighborhood, the value of your property and your quality of life. Right now the Town Board is engaged in updating our Zoning Code. This is necessary from time to time, as practical experience informs our judgment about potential improvement of processes or newly emerging issues that may require our attention.

Most significantly, an update is necessary to bring the Zoning Code into line with the Town's Comprehensive Plan. The Board can't change the law because of its own whims or the personal preferences of any of its members. Changes must derive from requirements or clear recommendations embodied in the Comprehensive Plan.

In 2019 the Town adopted a new Comprehensive Plan. Its adoption culminated five years of extensive public engagement and public input as to what kind of Town we want to live in. What kind of Town we want it to be. In addition to significant public workshops, the Town also employed a technique often used by municipalities preparing a Comprehensive Plan: an extensive and detailed community survey. You told us what you want and what you didn't want. Based on your advice, the Comprehensive Plan took shape.

First on the list of the fundamental goals stated in the Comprehensive Plan is "Community Character: to maintain and enhance Pittsford's physical character and quality of life, by managing future growth and development and protecting existing resources..."

To keep faith with this and the other provisions of the Comprehensive Plan in updating the Zoning Code, we still need to hear from the public. A Zoning Code is much more detailed than the Comprehensive Plan on which it's based.

As the Town Board sorts through these details and makes choices, continued engagement with our residents is essential.

Neither you nor we can undo the provisions of the Comprehensive Plan, or change it or revise the Zoning Code, based on any of our own personal preferences or those of any individual resident. Our goal – our duty – in revising the Zoning Code is to do so consistent with the broad consensus of our community.

That's what the Town Board has done as we've gone through the Code. I have every confidence in our Town Board continuing to do just that. The indispensable element to doing it and doing it right is continued engagement with you, our residents. We don't want to pave over the lawn inadvertently. We need you to attend the Zoning Update meetings or to submit your comments by email. You'll find information on upcoming meetings on the Town's website at: www.townofpittsford.org/calendar.

Working with our consultants, the Board is going through the code in public session, section by section. As of this writing, so far we've considered and have informally agreed on how we'll move forward with commercial, industrial and office zoning, the Monroe Avenue corridor, the fundamental components of residential zoning that could affect neighborhood character (which is what most residents are concerned about), commercial signage, parking and lighting regulations.

I say "informally" agreed because the updated code will not be made final until the Town Board votes on the entire package, as a local law to amend the code, following a formal public hearing. We're not amending the code bit-bybit as we go through it. We're deciding, provisionally,

Keep Pollinators in Mind During Spring Yard Cleanup

As you begin spring cleanup, please think about our pollinator friends! Many pollinators hibernate in the same piles of dead leaves and hollow stems we want to clear out. Pollinators need to continue their long winter's rest to do their important work this spring and summer. To help our pollinator friends, consider delaying the removal of dead leaves and plants until evening temperatures remain reliably in the 50s or above. If you must get a jump on tidying your lawn, consider gently moving leaf piles to one corner of the yard or leaving just the piles that have collected around trees, fences and your garden until the weather is consistently warmer.

When cleaning up, keep an eye out for nesting bees, chrysalises and cocoons. If you pick out old stems that have pollinators nesting within, move them to a safe spot in your garden so they can finish hibernating and emerge ready to do their hard work. To really help pollinators, consider being part of the Pittsford Pollinator Pathway and take our Toxic-Free Lawn Challenge!


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Zoning Code Update Meetings – Attend Online or in Person

The Pittsford Town Board continues its public meetings to consider updates to the Town's Zoning Code. The purpose of this process is to bring the Code into line with directives and recommendations in the Town's most recent Comprehensive Plan. We will include upcoming meeting dates in the Town's weekly eNews and on the Town's online calendar at **www.townofpittsford.org/calendar**. You can attend these meetings, watch them online and view archived recordings.

Public participation is essential to assuring an outcome consistent with the Comprehensive Plan and in tune with the broad consensus of our community as expressed in that Plan. You can comment in person at each meeting, submit in advance by email or regular mail or submit email comments during the meeting. Meetings are streamed live and recorded; recordings are on the Town website. Comment submission and viewing information can be found on each meeting's calendar listing. 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what will be in the complete package we'll consider for adoption. We'll make sure to provide adequate public notice of the hearing or hearings. These hearings will be especially important. Your presence will help me and the Board to stay in accord with what most of our residents want and expect.

At our next zoning update meeting, on Thursday, May 30 at 6:00PM at Town Hall, the Board will consider the Supplemental Regulations for residential areas. These include such things as sheds, outdoor storage, fences and hedges, swimming pools, antennnas and ponds. You'll find the full list on our website.

I realize that much of the Zoning Code involves relatively arcane matters. Yet much, especially residential provisions, if changed substantially in ways incompatible with the Comprehensive Plan, could steer Pittsford and its quality of life away not just from what the Plan contemplates but from what you, our residents, compellingly and unambiguously have asked for and expect.

Since I took on the duties of Town Supervisor, there's one comment I've heard more frequently and consistently, from residents of all backgrounds and all walks of life, than any other: "Don't change Pittsford." Now of course, we're changing Pittsford all the time. My central commitment as Town Supervisor is to seek continual improvement for our residents. Adding sidewalks,


improving our trails, opening a dog park, creating a nature preserve, adopting environmentally aware policies and practices, improving Town processes and so much more. But these fall into the category of "enhancing Pittsford's physical character and quality of life," as expressed in our Comprehensive Plan. Things like these aren't what you're talking about when you tell us not to change.

You're talking about that unique collection of attributes and characteristics that makes the place recognizable as the Pittsford we know as our home.

It may have been expressed best by a resident who commented on the Zoning Code update at one of our meetings, who reminded us that we live in a successful community whose character, schools, quality of life and way of life are widely admired; a place where people aspire to live, concluding: "Pittsford's not broken. You don't need to 'fix' it."

I'm just one of the overwhelming majority of Pittsford residents who feel the same way.
